 - I have always been drawn to public service, as a young school aged person I volunteered as part of Boy Scouts, 4H, and other youth programs. I found that while the work was hard at times it was also rewarding when you saw the good your efforts brought to the community. As I became an adult I wanted to be a part of shaping our community. Having the experience of growing up here in Chaffee County I felt my knowledge of our history and how growth and change had affected other small mountain communities I wanted to use that knowledge to help prevent our area from making some of the mistakes I saw made in other towns.
 - I served as the county chairman of the Chaffee County Republican party for three years and gained a lot of knowledge on how our political systems affect our lives. Then in 2009 I was appointed to the Poncha Springs Planning and Zoning board and really enjoyed learning the process of town government. I was elected to the Board of Trustees in 2012 and served as Mayor Pro-Tem for four years. In 2016 I was elected Mayor and again in 2019. This will be my third term as Mayor and I am very proud of the strides our town has made.

As Mayor of Poncha Springs this would not be a guiding principle for our land use policy, we have our own policies and ideas of what is beneficial to our town.
